If a survey were to be conducted among churchgoers in which they were asked for a definition of religion it is unlikely that many would come up with the simple answer provided by James. Coming to the help of orphans and widows would be for many a kind of agreeable by-product of religion whereas James places it right at the centre of who we are and what we do. This is surely a message for today when so many people go to such great lengths in their search for wisdom and the knowledge of God. A religion that can be observed at a purely external level has a certain appeal. It is easy to feel we are making progress and that we are better than those who do not measure up. We imagine that by our own efforts we can come close to God. However, Jesus wants no part in such a sham. He is concerned with the heart and a faith that does iustice. Irish Jesuits

Liturgical Calendar

Tues 3 Sept: St Gregory The Great - Memorial (540-604). In 590 he was called to be bishop of Rome and pope. He was the pope who sent Augustine to Canterbury. Pope Gregory was a preacher, an author, a homilist, an exegete, a theologian. He is recognized as a Father of the Church, truly a great man.

Wed 4 Sept: St Cuthbert c. 634-687 entered the monastery at Melrose before moving as prior to Lindisfarne Island and introducing Roman customs. In 685 he became Bishop of Lindisfarne.

Thurs 5 Sept: St Teresa of Calcutta, opt. Mem. (1910-1997) born in Skopje, Albania. Her father died when she was nine. Moved to be a missionary and entered the Sisters of Loretto in Ireland, Left for Calcutta in 1929 and established a religious community the Missionaries of Charity, dedicated to serving the poorest of the poor. She was awarded the Nobel Peace prize in 1979 and canonised by Pope Francis in 2016.

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture:

This people honours me only with lipservice,

while their hearts are far from me. The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations.

You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.' He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within and make a man unclean.'
